Tools, Languages, and Their Effects

Read chapters 0 and 1 of *MacLennan*. At the end of Chapter 1, in §1.4, MacLennan abstracts one of the levels of meaning that has been implicit in the reading: the interpretation of a programming language as a tool, with ampliative and reductive effects similar to other tools, and the psychological effects the various aspects of tools usage may have on their users.

Think about these aspects of tools. Read and think about Exercises 1-47 through 1-52 beginning on page 35. Then compose and write a short essay in response to one of these exercises. If you choose Exercise 1-47, please limit your consideration to **one** common tool, rather than the several suggested in the textbook, so your essay does not become too long.

Style

Following the title, quote the exercise that you are responding to in italics, with an attribution.
