2009 Tax Rates for Married Filing Jointly:

10% tax on first \$16,700 of taxable income 15% on next \$51,200 of taxable income 25% on next \$69,150 of taxable income 28% on next \$71,800 of taxable income 33% on next \$164,000 of taxable income 35% on remaining taxable income
